AN INTRODUCTION TO UNITED NATIONS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS - 9 (UN- SDG 9): INDUSTRY, INNOVATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Sustainable Development Goal 9 (Goal 9 or SDG 9) is about "industry, innovation and infrastructure" and is one of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals adopted by the United Nations General Assembly in 2015. SDG 9 aims to build resilient infrastructure, promote sustainable industrialization and foster innovation.



SDG 9 has eight targets, and progress is measured by twelve indicators. The first five targets are outcome targets: develop sustainable, resilient and inclusive infrastructures; promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization; increase access to financial services and markets; upgrade all industries and infrastructures for sustainability; enhance research and upgrade industrial technologies. The remaining three targets are means of implementation targets. Facilitate sustainable infrastructure development for developing countries; support domestic technology development and industrial diversification; universal access to information and communications technology.

In 2019, it was reported that "the intensity of global carbon dioxide emissions has declined by nearly one quarter since 2000, showing a general decoupling of carbon dioxide emissions from GDP growth". Millions of people are still unable to access the internet due to cost, coverage, and other reasons. It is estimated that just 54% of the world's population are currently (in 2020) internet users.

The aim of attaining inclusive and sustainable industrialization is to "unleash dynamic and competitive economic forces that generate employment and income". This goal includes striving for resilience (engineering and construction) and urban resilience.

SDG 9 recognizes that humanity's ability to connect and communicate effectively, move people and things efficiently, and develop new skills, industries and technology, is crucial in overcoming the many interlinked economic, social and environmental challenges in the 21st century. n order to have a successful community, a functioning, and strong infrastructure has to be in place as its basic requirement. SDG 9 is all about promoting innovative and sustainable technologies and ensuring equal and universal access to information and financial markets.

The technological development in infrastructure is what gives rise to a sustainable society. This is expected to create prosperity and jobs and build stable and prosperous societies across the globe. The key emphasis is on developing reliable and sustainable infrastructural solutions that support economic development and human well-being while ensuring financial affordability. This goal aims to ensure that every society in the world possesses good infrastructure.

Achieving SDG 9 will require significant financing and political will. Key challenges include improving internet access in developing countries, inadequate transport, (particularly in land-locked developing countries), and the disparity of Research and Development investment and the number of researchers in developing countries when compared to developed countries.

In order to have a successful community, a functioning, and strong infrastructure has to be in place as its basic requirement. SDG 9 is all about promoting innovative and sustainable technologies and ensuring equal and universal access to information and financial markets.

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic began in 2020, the world manufacturing growth was said to be declining. The pandemic hit industries hard and caused disruptions in the value chains of goods and their supply, and has affected the digitization of business and services such as video conferencing, healthcare, teleworking, etc.

Economic growth, social development, and climate action heavily depend on infrastructure investments, sustainable industrial development, and technological progress. In the face of a rapidly changing global economic landscape and increasing inequalities, sustained growth must include industrialization that first of all, makes opportunities accessible to all people, and second, is supported by innovation and resilient infrastructure.

As of 2022, 95 percent of the world's population was within reach of a mobile broadband network, but some areas remain underserved. Investment in research and development globally - as well as financing for economic infrastructure in developing countries - has increased, and impressive progress has been made in mobile connectivity, with almost the entire world population (97 percent) living within reach of a mobile cellular signal. Investments in infrastructure - transport, irrigation, energy, and information and communication technology - are crucial to achieving sustainable development and empowering communities in many countries. To achieve Goal 9 by 2030, supporting LDCs, investing in advanced technologies, lowering carbon emissions, and increasing mobile broadband access is essential.

Inclusive and sustainable industrialization and innovation and infrastructure can unleash dynamic and competitive economic forces that generate employment and income. They play a key role in introducing and promoting new technologies, facilitating international trade, and enabling the efficient use of resources. The growth of new industries means improvement in the standard of living for many of us. If industries pursue sustainability, this approach will positively affect the environment.

The price is steep. Ending poverty would be more difficult, given the industry's role as a core driver of the global development agenda to eradicate poverty and advance sustainable development. Additionally, failing to improve infrastructure and promote technological innovation could translate into poor health care, inadequate sanitation, and limited access to education.

In order to achieve targets under SDG 9, we are required to work on establishing standards and promoting regulations that ensure company projects and initiatives sustainably managed, collaborating with NGOs and the public sector to help in promoting sustainable growth within developing countries and thinking about how industry impacts on our life and well-being and use social media to push for policymakers to prioritize the SDGs.

Conclusion

While SDG 9 implementation is progressing in many areas, more resources and capacity are needed in developing countries, especially LDCs and African countries, where industrialization rates continue to lag and the benefits of the digital revolution remain elusive. There is a need to further elaborate on areas where more progress can be made, as well as on policy coherence among development, infrastructure, industrialization, and Science Technology, and Innovation-integrated national policy approaches; and the identification of gaps and successes.





World Development Report 2023 on Migrants, Refugees, and Societies

The World Bank's annual World Development Reports, or WDRs, are staples of the global community's reservoir of knowledge and data about key development issues. This year's Report discusses migration, one of the world's most important and pressing challenges. There are 184 million migrants worldwide. Of them, 43 percent live in low- and middle-income countries. Migration issues are becoming even more widespread and urgent due to severe divergences between and within countries-in terms of real wages, labor market opportunities, demographic patterns, and climate costs.

The WDR discusses the migration trade-offs using a "Match-Motive Framework." The "match" aspect is grounded in labor economics and focuses on how well migrants' skills and related attributes match the needs of the destination countries.

This Report provides a comprehensive analysis of international migration and its potential to serve as a force for growth and shared prosperity in all countries. It focuses on people who lack citizenship in the country in which they live: about 184 million people across the world, including 37 million refugees.
